Summer Refuge Update

With the summer heat comes a lull in visitation, but the refuge staff remained busy mowing and repairing roads and dikes, conducting habitat improvement projects, controlling exotic/invasive plants and writing or administering contracts. Perhaps the biggest event over the summer was President Obama's "Stimulus Package". The refuge submitted a list of projects with the hope that one would be funded. As it turned out several projects were selected and funded. Six wetland sites were restored with Stimulus funding where refuge staff removed dikes and reconnected impoundments to the lagoon. The reconnection will help restore the natural salt marsh and allow marine organisms to once again utilize the wetlands. Ultimately these restoration projects will improve water quality and the productivity of the lagoon. The National Oceanographic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA) is also interested in marsh restoration and they received \$2.7 million in Stimulus Funding for additional restoration work in and around the refuge. The NOAA funding will restore 7 additional impoundments on the refuge and Congresswoman Suzanne Kosmas visited the refuge for a briefing on the projects.

The refuge received Stimulus funding for another project to restore the wetland swales in scrub habitat. As MIWA members may recall, one of the highest refuge priorities is to restore scrub jay habitat and over the years, many of the grassy swales embedded in the scrub have become overgrown with trees. The tree fragment degrades the quality of the site for scrub-jays and this conversion will better enable jays to move between two territories. This habitat restoration project will begin in 2010. Finally, another \$700,000 of Stimulus Funding was earmarked to replace the triple wide trailers where the Biological and Law Enforcement staff is housed. The new building will be located near the Administrative Building and construction is scheduled to begin in early 2010.

The refuge also received (non-Stimulus) funding to pave the Manatee Observation Deck Road, construct a larger parking lot, and replace the wooden manatee observation deck with an elevated concrete deck. The project will likely begin in 2010 after the engineering work is complete and a contractor has been selected.

The refuge administered 5 exotic plant eradication projects over the summer. The contracts targeted melaluka, Brazilian pepper, air potatoes, rosary pea, and old world climbing fern and has helped to reclaim several hundred acres of refuge land. Most of the \$200,000 in funding came from Florida Department of Environmental Protection with a smaller match from the refuge. The refuge is also administering a contract to thin pines trees in scrub sites. Recent prescribed fires have resulted in the regeneration of very dense stands of pines. In some locations, there are as many as 500 pines per acre and the project is to thin the trees to a more natural 6-8 trees per acre. The overcrowded conditions will result in stunted pine growth, extreme fire behavior during prescribed or wildfires, and degraded habitat for scrub jays and other species.

Several other construction projects wrapped up over the summer. The contract to pave SR 406, Bairs Cove Road and install a deceleration lane at the east entrance was completed. A separate contract was completed to install a paved turnaround at the Visitor Center gate. Visitors stop at this location after hours to pick up leaflets. As part of this same project the contractor striped the parking lot at the east kiosk

The completion of these projects will better prepare the refuge for the busy upcoming winter season and help improve refuge habitats for our primary mission – the wildlife that calls Merritt Island home.

PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

Fellow MIWA Members, following are update items for your information:

The MIWA board met at the Dixie Crossroads Restaurant on August 12th for our annual Blue Sky meeting. Board member, Laurilee Thompson, owner of the establishment, sponsored the luncheon and facility for our meeting. I would like to personally thank her for all she has done for MIWA and all its members over the years. When you see her at our annual meeting in October, please do the same.

It is at this meeting that the MIWR staff provides us with a list of proposed refuge projects for the following fiscal year. Dorn Whitmore - MINWR liaison to MIWA, gave a prioritized list to us. After some discussion, the board divided the list into three basic categories listed below for a total commitment of \$89,980.

- Tier 1 projects, which focused on environmental education, transportation and bookstore security at a cost of \$69,300.
- Reoccurring expenses at a cost of \$20,680.
- Tier 2 projects at a cost of \$26,000, were tabled pending further review

Be sure to watch for your invitation in the mail for our annual meeting to be held October 14th, at the Debus Center at the KSC Visitors Complex. We have an exciting agenda that will include MIWA board member nominations, dinner, cash bar, silent auction a refuge update from Dorn, a first-time NASA update from Mario Busacca (NASA liaison) and our guest speaker, Blair Witherington. Volunteers will clean up, as well as, conduct an important survey on the type and amount of litter found. Directly after, volunteers are invited to enjoy a free hot dog and refreshments sponsored by M.I.W.A
- **Waterfowl Hunt Expo and Workshop:** Merritt Island National Wildlife Refuge is hosting a Waterfowl Workshop and Expo on Saturday, September 12 partnering with United Waterfowlers of Florida. Captain Tarr's Fish Tale

Merritt Island National Wildlife Refuge is a world renowned birder's paradise. Tourists flock to the area to see the more than 300 different species of birds that utilize the refuge lands. Equipped with cameras, video equipment, binoculars, and a variety of other tools, the birders are easily spotted along the various roads and trails; each one eager to spot the one species that they have never seen. A lot of attention is focused on this activity, and deservedly so; it brings in millions of dollars to our local economy. I have been asked to bring a little attention to another part of the refuge: the waters that encompass a vast portion of the refuge. These waterways include Mosquito Lagoon, the Indian River and the Banana River.

When I was asked to start writing this article, I was both excited and a little apprehensive. I was perplexed at what type of article people would be interested in. I wanted to bring forth the love that I have for fishing, wildlife and the waters. I wasn't sure how to express everything I wanted: types of fish available, basic biology of each species, feeding patterns, fishing tips, proper handling techniques and last, but definitely not least, conservation. It wasn't until I could sit down with my son and a young fly fishing enthusiast at my shop and listen to them talking about fishing, that I decided I have to try and encompass everything. Those two boys listened to every word that I spoke, especially the ones about proper care and conservation. This will include first hand observations made by several professional guides and myself. The articles will also describe what you can do to help. I hope you enjoy these articles and find them informative and helpful. My goal is to make your fishing trips more successful and at the same time, help preserve our fishery so I can continue to see kid's eyes light up when they describe their own fishing trips.

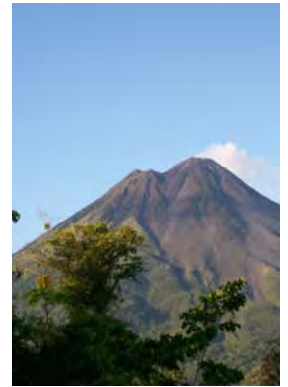

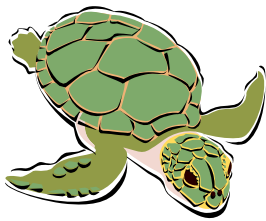

The Ups and Downs of Sea Turtle Walks

Turtle walks are always popular and MIWA hosted two “Member’s Only” programs this summer. On June 26th, twenty nine MIWA members attended a walk lead by Ranger, Nancy Corona. Members enjoyed an educational power point, and afterwards assisted by volunteers, Bill Nunn & Jo Ann Heenan, headed off to the seashore. CNS Park Guide, Beverly Osborne, acting turtle rover for the evening, spotted a nesting turtle for the group. All enjoyed watching the turtle lay her eggs, cover the nest, and slowly drag herself back to the ocean. After

covering the nest with a protective screen and tagging it with a wooded stake, the turtle was named Flippy by the group. Good work members!

The next walk wasn’t as lucky. On July 24th, twenty eight members attended a program also hosted by Nancy. Unfortunately, severe weather halted any attempt of visiting the seashore, and the program was cancelled. Be aware that programs may be cancelled due to lightening or NASA security closures and can not be rescheduled. Any member that attended the cancelled program can sign up for the 2010 sea turtle walks and give it another try!

Biologist Note: for 2009, 848 loggerhead, 62 green and 4 leatherbacks nests have been documented.

Loggerhead numbers are below last years 1106, but this still represents the 2nd highest total in the past six years. However, the long term trend in loggerhead nesting numbers is still one of decline.

Green nesting numbers are lower than last year (118), but as you are aware, green nesting numbers are highly variable year to year. Overall, green nesting numbers have been increasing over the past 20 years.

Leatherback nesting this year is probably slightly higher than average, but you really can't consider four nests as anything but typical for our stretch of beach.

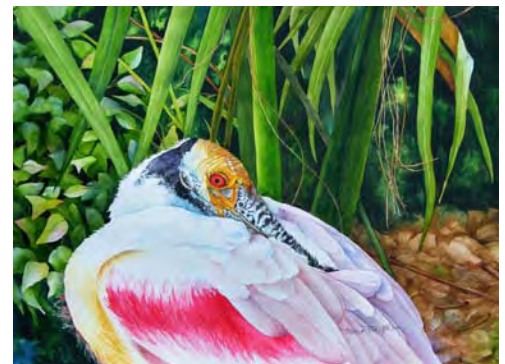


7th Annual Brevard Watercolor Society Exhibition

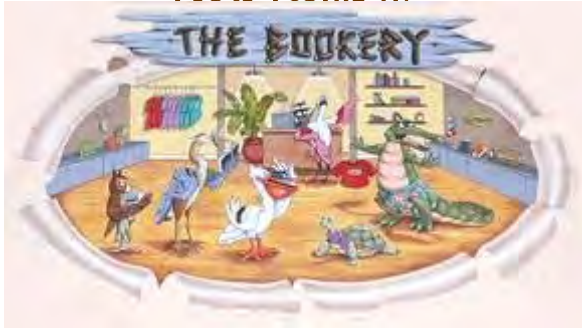
