Moore replica home now open to visitors

It's been three years from fruition to reality, and many agree it's long overdue, but the Harry T. and Harriette V. Moore home is finally rebuilt.

The yellow house, an exact replica of America's first civil rights martyrs, was opened and dedicated Nov. 22 in front of a large crowd at Moore Memorial Park in Mims.

"Now I can come home again," said Evangeline Moore, the couple's only living daughter, who came to the event with her son, Drapner "Skip" Pagan.

Moore recounted how so many important ideas came to Moore while in their home. From laying the first foundation of the area's NAACP to organizing the Progressive Voters League and registering 116,000 blacks into the Democratic Party in 1944. From investigating lynchings in 1944 to being fired from the Brevard County School Board for rocking the boat, something Moore did well.

"Then in 1949 from this house he investigated the Groveland case ... and demanded (Lakeland County) Sheriff (Willie) McCall be arrested for murder for shooting two young black men accused of raping a white woman," recounted the frail Moore.

The two men were shackled by hands and feet and riding in McCall's police car to their trial when the sheriff said the men overpowered him causing him to shoot them. One died and the other was shot in the back. This, many believe, was the catalyst that led to the Moore's deaths.

"From this house in 1951 on Christmas night, the KKK sneaked up and ignited dynamite under the house. Dad was dead on arrival at the Sanford hospital. ... Mom died (nine days later)."

The house is more than four walls with furniture and hanging plants in the front, it's a symbol that this slaying must never happen again, said Sen. Tony Hill, who along with then Rep. Bob Allen appealed to the Florida Senate for grants to build the house.

"I was happy to have this in my district," said Allen. "It's progress and this house needs to be here."

Hill said although he's overjoyed that the house is now back on the property, which is part of the park, he's concerned that the younger generation has lost touch

with what happened and how the Moore's deaths helped future people.

"We're not telling the next generation and it's important they know," he said.

Hill referred to some of Harriette Moore's last words, "We did all we could do; now it's time for someone else," and emphasized that the Moores and everything they stood for, including justice and equality for all people, must not ever be forgotten.

The event began with a brief speech from Brevard County Commissioner Robin Fisher.

"Mr. Moore fought for what we now take for granted like equal pay and jobs," he said, giving an example of how Moore would be impressed knowing that Robert Jordan, a black man, represents the area on the Brevard County School Board and served as its chairman from 2005-2008.

Hill, Allen, then County Commissioner Truman Scarborough and others worked tirelessly to get funding,

along with the cultural complex incorporation, a not-for-profit group, whose responsibility is to enhance the development and operation of the Moore Memorial Park and Cultural Center through fund-raising, activities and physical improvements.

With the Moore house now complete, the second phase begins soon, which includes a reflecting pool, pavilion, outdoor restrooms, meditation garden and a mausoleum so the Moores can be relocated from LaGrange Cemetery, said the not-for-profit group's president Bill Gary.

He also announced that the Florida Citrus Council donated 30 citrus trees on the property. The Moores had many citrus trees on their land.

We watch the news and have a perception of countries we've never been to. Just the sound of the country's name and we get a feeling of what we think the country is like – aggressive, mean, nice, beautiful. Sometimes we have no perception at all about a country; we just know we've never been there and don't know too much about it.

We had the pleasure of having a 20-year-old South Korean man over for the Thanksgiving holiday. "KC" came home with my son who's attending his high

school senior year at Interlochen Arts Academy in Michigan. That school has 450 students from 45 states and 23 nations. They get along just fine – language barriers and all. They have a common love for what they do, be it music, art, filmmaking or drama. While each student must speak English, they can't help but "teach" each other parts of their own language and customs. And believe me, they all come home with some rather funny stories – most are unprintable.

Many Asian students there, for whatever reason, have picked an English-sounding name as a nickname, and my son's tuba-playing friend has chosen the name KC.

This was KC's first time visiting Florida and he really got a kick out of it. The things we take for granted – even the gentle, soft moss that hangs from the trees – was a marvel to him; key lime pie, the hundreds of lizards outside and all the palm trees were his favorites.

While I've never been to South Korea, I've met a few natives from that country

in our Army travels over the years. It's interesting just asking questions and listening to people about their country – the way they eat, what they eat, daily interesting things about their culture. I've always had two left feet when it comes to eating with chopsticks, but I think KC finally taught me how to do it when we went to Bangkok Thai Restaurant the other night, which, by the way, he absolutely loved. We asked him how to say chopstick in Korean.

"Chopstick," he answered, looking rather smug.

"OK, that's one Korean word we know," we laughed.

If international political scholars could use Interlochen Arts Academy for a model, you could say that politically it's a perfect world. Everyone gets along, no one makes fun of one another (seriously, this is true), each student has respect for one another because they share a common goal – to be the best at their craft. While there's competition, the students see it as a way to be even better, fueling

their drive to succeed. They see someone from another country not as an enemy but as a friend and a way to learn more about the world. My son's roommate is from South Africa. What an education he's learned just about Johann and his part of the globe, including learning Afrikaans and Dutch words.

If nations could act like Interlochen globally what a great world this would be. If you can put 450 kids together from 23 nations and live in harmony with each other, one has to ask why it can't happen on a larger scale.

The school's motto is "Art lives here." While this is true, there's more that lives there – respect, friendship and 450 ambassadors. Forget the international peace summits – the heads of nations should gather at Interlochen and ask the students how it's done.

The answer I think they'd give is to embrace rather than hate, marvel instead of recoiling, extend a hand instead of making a fist, applaud each other instead of making fun.

Simple cooking tips can lower your utility bill

It takes a lot of energy – both physical and electrical – to prepare meals for family and friends during the holidays. Whether you're cooking Christmas dinner for relatives or baking cookies for an office potluck, keep these tips in mind to minimize your electricity usage in the kitchen:

Florida Power & Light Company offers the following tips to help customers lower their utility bills, especially during the holidays.

✓ Don't waste energy by unnecessarily pre-heating your oven. Some

foods, such as bread and desserts, require preheating, but holiday meal staples such as turkey and ham don't.

✓ Keep the oven door closed. Ovens lose lots of heat when opened and require significant energy to heat back up to the appropriate temperature. Instead of opening the door to check on your food, turn on the interior light and look through the oven's window.

✓ Oven-bake as many items together as you can. Although some items may cook at different temperatures, many items can be cooked at a standard tem-

perature.

✓ Use smaller appliances such as crock-pots, microwaves and toaster ovens when possible. These can be much more energy-efficient for side dishes or small meals.

✓ Match the size of your pan to the size of the heating element. For example, when using an electric cook top, a six-inch pan on an eight-inch burner will waste more than 40 percent of the heat produced by the burner.

✓ Choose glass or ceramic pans for the oven. These pans heat faster than

metal ones and allow you to set the temperature 25 degrees lower than a recipe suggests for the same cooking time.

✓ When possible, cover your pots and pans. This can help cook your food more quickly and keeps the cooking temperature higher, which allows you to turn down the stove.

✓ Only use as much water as you need in a pot. Every extra drop requires more energy to heat and increases the cooking time.

Be careful with holiday decorations this season

As you deck the halls this holiday season, be fire smart. Follow these Christmas tree safety tips from NFPA.org.

▶ If you have an artificial tree, be sure it's labeled, certified or identified by the manufacturer as fire-retardant.

▶ Choose a tree with fresh, green needles that do not fall off when touched.

▶ Before placing the tree in the stand, cut 1-2 inches from the base of the trunk.

▶ Make sure the tree is at least three feet away from any heat source, such as fireplaces, radiators, candles,

heat vents or lights.

▶ Make sure the tree is not blocking an exit.

▶ Add water to the tree stand. Be sure to add water daily.

▶ Use lights that have the label of an independent testing laboratory. Some lights are only for indoor or outdoor use, but not both.

▶ Replace any string of lights with worn or broken cords or loose bulb connections. Connect no more than three strands of mini string sets and a maximum of 50 bulbs for screw-in bulbs.

▶ Never use lit candles to decorate the tree.

▶ Always turn off Christmas tree lights before leaving home or going to bed.

▶ Get rid of the tree when it begins dropping needles.

▶ Dried-out trees are a fire danger and should not be left in the home or garage or placed outside against the home.

▶ Bring outdoor electrical lights inside after the holidays to prevent hazards and make them last longer.

Your Feet

YOUR KNEES WANT TO TAKE YOU SHOE SHOPPING

The shoes you wear may have significant effects on your osteoarthritis of the knee. Knee osteoarthritis is caused by cartilage breakdown in the knee joint. Factors that increase the risk of knee osteoarthritis include being overweight, age, injury or stress to the joints. Family history can also increase the risk of knee osteoarthritis. Knee OA is increasing in frequency in our overweight and aging society.

In knee OA, there is abundant evidence that patients with abnormally high loading knees (high amounts of stress on part or all of the knee joint) are at increased risk of both injury and disease progression.

Researchers studied the effects of various types of footwear. Each participant underwent gait analysis (evaluation of the way they walk and load their knees)

while barefoot and while wearing a clog, a stability shoe (designed to limit foot movement), a flat, flexible walking shoe (designed to allow significant foot movement), and flip-flops.

Knee loads play an important role in the progression of knee osteoarthritis. Shoes have traditionally been engineered to provide foot comfort and little previous attention has been directed to the effects that shoes may have on loading of osteoarthritic knees. Researchers found that clogs and stability shoes were associated with significantly higher loading of the knees, while the walking shoes and flip-flops resulted in lower knee loads similar to those occurring when walking barefoot. Therefore, shoes that allowed natural foot motion and flexibility appeared to be more beneficial in terms of knee loading.

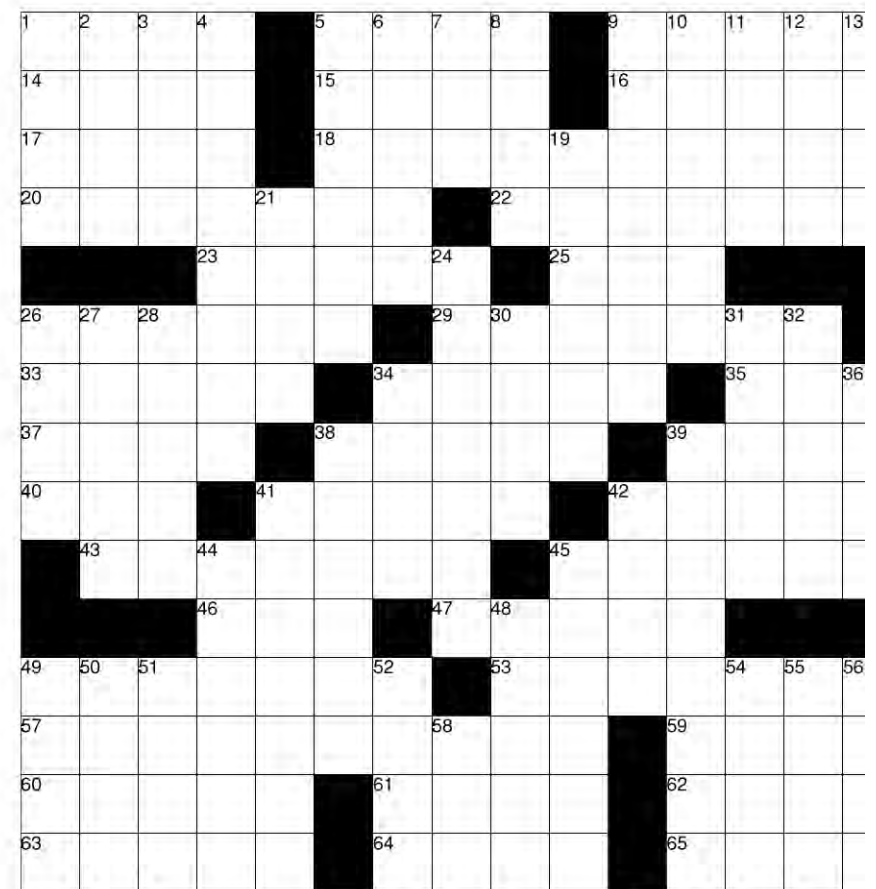
