



COMMUNITY REDEVELOPMENT AGENCY (CRA) UPDATES

Indian River Force Main Infrastructure Improvements



onstruction for the Indian River Force Main Project started Monday, August 7. The project includes replacing approximately 8,000 feet of existing 12-inch sewer line with new 16-inch sewer force main, from South Street north to the Osprey Water Reclamation Facility on Buffalo Road. The force main replacement will start at the intersection of South Street and Indian River Avenue and will continue north under the Max Brewer Causeway, U.S. Highway 1, and even a portion of the FEC railroad, ending at the Osprey Facility.

Road closures to through traffic will occur during construction; however, roads will remain open for residents and businesses in the area. Titusville's Public Works is working with the contractor to minimize the effect of the closures on residents, and closures will be limited to block segments at any one time. Anticipated closures will be posted on Titusville's website and social media at least 36 hours prior to occurrence. Titusville residents should check the website for the latest information on the project.

Spaceview Park Walkway Pier Project



his project consists of a 200-foot concrete pier with benches and lights connecting Veterans Park with Spacview Park. The CRA voted to award the bid to Rush Marine at the August 8, 2023 meeting. The project contract has been executed, and the kickoff meeting is scheduled for October.

CRA Community Outreach Meeting



n September 1, 2023 at St. Gabriel's Episcopal Church, a CRA Community Outreach meeting was held regarding the vision and future for the Downtown and CRA area. This meeting was a positive event with approximately 63 attendees sharing ideas and concepts for proposed updates to the City of Titusville's Comprehensive Plan.

Astronauts:

Many astronauts have visited KSC, both before and after their spaceflights, most notably Alan Shepard, the first American in space; John Glenn, the first American to orbit Earth; and Sally Ride, the first American woman in space. Let's not forget Neil Armstrong, the first person to walk on the Moon during the Apollo 11 mission in 1969, visited KSC on multiple occasions for training and mission preparations.

Various actors, musicians, and athletes, have visited KSC out of their interest in space exploration.

DLP Capital's Space Coast Dreams come true after a five-year, \$22-million renovation.

LP Capital, a prominent private real estate investment and financial services firm, has successfully completed its major redevelopment project, Dream Space Coast, after a five-year, \$22-million transformation.

Situated along the Indian River Lagoon across from Kennedy Space Center, the 182-unit, two-tower, multifamily complex was initially constructed during the mid-1960s space industry boom leading to the Apollo moon missions. Over the years, it has changed names and owners and has endured its share of woes. However, DLP says their multiyear project has created a modern, "attainably priced" rental option for the community. DLP Capital's objective with this project was clear — to preserve the property's historical significance while modernizing it to meet the needs of today's residents, including the new era of space workers and other professionals

"In 2018... we were deciding whether or not it would make sense to take a community that had needs, that had the opportunity, that was fantastically located; bring it back to life and create a great living environment for the working American," stated Amy Barricelli, Senior Vice President of Lease-Ups & Sales Acceleration at DLP Capital. "Essentially, we were drawn to it because it matched our mission — to provide homes that are attainably priced for the working American."

"This is by far one of the best multifamily locations on the Space Coast, directly across from launch sites," said Don Wenner, Founder and CEO of DLP Capital. "We're excited to contribute to the property's history

And contribute, DLP has. The company embarked on an extensive renovation project, maintaining the historic exterior while gutting the interiors to bring them into the 21st century.

FROM MEMORY LANE TO MODERN-DAY WAY

Initially built in 1964 and known as Imperial Towers, the complex at 2825 S. Washington Ave. was called "Titusville's Hallmark of Excellence." Vintage advertisements from its heyday boasted amenities such as "yearround electric air conditioning." They offered features such as mini-golf, a cocktail lounge, and a dock for watching Apollo moon shots.

Today, the revitalized community offers a plethora of amenities, from smart features to a riverfront pool and tranquility garden.

"You know, a community can get a day older or get a day better," remarked Barricelli as she cited the many advantages to living at Dream Space Coast. The complex allows residents to participate in waterfront workout classes and poolside yoga, while the Resident Center features billiards, poker tables, an eCafe, and a business center. The complex also includes a cardio fitness center, cycle and yoga/Pilates studios, valet dry cleaning, an Amazon package center, and a pet park.

One significant advantage to living there is the front-row seating for the myriad space launches that occur almost weekly. Many units have perfect unobstructed views across the water of America's Space Port. Beyond the Kennedy Space Center, the complex's proximity to Canaveral National Seashore, including Playalinda Beach and the Merritt Island National Wildlife Refuge, offers residents a unique connection to nature. The beach, stretching 24 miles along the east coast of Florida, is home to over 1,000 plant species, endangered and protected sea turtles, and 310 bird species.

SPACE

Plans for the property include possibly adding a kayak launch from the shoreline behind the south parking lot between Dream Space Coast and the neighboring Village Inn restaurant. This beach, Barricelli noted, has been underutilized throughout the years and would be an excellent option for such an amenity.

"We try to create great experiences where our renters can enjoy a neighborhood feel right within our doors," Barricelli commented, "So... we can have some kind of event like the bioluminescent kayak tours at night from our property or offer any of those kinds of ideas for enhancement."

ATTAINABLY PRICED LUXURY

The two multifamily towers at Dream Space Coast, spanning six stories each, offer a range of apartments, including studios, one-bedroomone-bath, and two-bedroom-two-bath, furnished and unfurnished apartments. Most units provide unobstructed views of space launches, ensuring that residents can continue participating in the region's rich space history. Importantly, rental rates are expected to remain under 30% of the local astro-tech market's median income, making it an attractive option for the community's target demographic. While the space industry is a key target, DLP seeks to be diversified when it comes to prospective tenants, seeking to cater to professionals from all industries and sectors: hospital workers, law enforcement, veterans the gates are wide, and all are welcome.

Dream Space Coast boasts of very flexible leasing options, providing prospective tenants with long-term options of one- or two-year leases, as well as short-term options for visiting professionals on a contract, allowing for six- or eight-month temporary housing in the furnished units. Presently, there are a total of eight units designated in the South Tower as fully- furnished apartments.

A LABOR OF LOVE

The redevelopment of these historic towers presented its share of challenges. During the process, the property received official recognition and inclusion on the National Register of Historic Places, adding to its eminence as a high-end rental home complex, as well as the work needed to not only revitalize the property but maintain its historic significance.

"That was a big project that took us three-and-a-half to four years to finalize," noted Barricelli, "we were in the library; we were literally doing the homework with a historian."

Jim Boyce, President of DLP Capital Development and Construction, emphasized the thoroughness of their efforts, saying, "We took the interior walls and ceilings off of every single unit in one tower. We went the extra mile." The second tower required less extensive rehabilitation; however, it also received a comprehensive overhaul along with cosmetic upgrades throughout. Notably, while the interior renovations were extensive, DLP Capital maintained the integrity of the impressive exterior structures built to withstand the test of time.

"They're solid, nearly impenetrable cinder blocks from top to bottom," Boyce added. "They don't make them like that anymore. . . We knew that once we rebuilt the interiors, this would be a truly superior multifamily asset."

Now Leasing

According to Barricelli, leasing has already begun, and she expects both towers to be available for tenants to move in by the end of October 2023. Prices are listed on the community's website, along with photos and floor plans. For more information go to DreamSpaceCoast.com.

ed Canyon Software, Inc., a Denver-based aerospace engineering and software company, has been diligently and meticulously renovating Launch Now - the former Citizen's Bank building and Walker hotel — in downtown Titusville, and it's finally time for their efforts to come to fruition. Launch Now has received its Certificate of Occupancy and is ready to jumpstart a huge wave of business in the downtown area.

Built in 1924, the hotel and adjoining bank are now listed on the National Register of Historic Places. Its Spanish-mission style construction, embellished by stucco finish, terra cotta decoration. outside terraces and an arched walkway, was commonplace in the 1920s, and Red Canyon's goal was to preserve that historic infrastructure in order to align with the authentic feel of Downtown Titusville.

"All of our historic amendments have been approved through the National Park Service," says Ciarra Taylor, Project Coordinator for Launch Now

The second and third floors of the property have been completely



converted into apartments — twelve one-bedroom, and eight studios which are being leased now and can be viewed through the online real estate marketplace Zillow. The first floor has been partially converted into open retail space and is being leased now through Rocket City Commercial. This includes four distinct retail spaces which can be left separated and leased individually, or utilized as one large open-air space. Next door in the former bank building, additional retail space is available for lease now.



Launch Now is just one of the many new businesses and projects that have opened in Downtown Titusville in the past several months. As tenants begin occupying the apartment units, Launch Now kindly requests that visitors of the adjacent businesses be aware the west parking lot is reserved for tenants of the building only, and to please not take up those much-needed spaces.



or many longtime residents of Titusville, the mere mention of - "Strings 'N Things" can evoke a wave of nostalgia. However, what might come as a surprise is that the musical duo behind Strings 'N Things, Wayne and Robyn Rogers, are still making music magic in our town. In the large two-story facility on Hopkins Avenue, Gold Tone Musical Group is a local treasure that often goes unnoticed by passersby. This year marks the 30th year of business for the musical instrument manufacturer, Gold Tone Musical Group, on top of the many years they operated as the local retail shop, Strings 'N Things.

The Rogers' musical journey began in the 1970s when Wayne went to Florida to pursue studies at Florida Atlantic University. Fate intervened when he crossed paths with the music-loving Robyn. Together, they identified a significant gap in the local music scene - the absence of stores catering to acoustic folk instruments. Determined to fill this void, Wayne and Robin took it upon themselves to be the trailblazers of what would eventually be three locations of Strings N' Things Music Store. Furthering their musical entrepreneurship, they also opened Strawberries Record kiosk in 1982 which was in the Sears Town Mall.

In 1977, Rogers unveiled Strings 'N Things Music Center, and it was an instant hit. The store

offered instruments and records and hosted individual and group music lessons for the local community. Their mission was clear: to provide affordable, highquality instruments for the hardworking local musicians as well as educating children and adults in everything from strings and pianos to horns and drums. Strings 'N Things also provided most Northern Brevard schools with band and orchestral instruments as



like Astronaut and Titusville high school with their gymnasium speakers. As music in the town was erupting, Strings 'N Things expanded into additional locations in Rockledge and Merritt Island.

In 1992, Wayne and Robyn decided to make a right-hand turn and leaned into a different segment of the music industry — manufacturing. With a strong retail background, they knew what retail owners expected from manufacturers: fair pricing, quality instruments, innovative concepts, and consistent inventory. With the love of Bluegrass and Folk music at the core of Wayne and Robyn's musical interest, Wayne started experimenting with banjo building in the back shed at his Windover home. Transforming a 10' x 16' wooden lawnmower shed into an artisan banjo building workshop was essential in giving the would be "Gold Tone" company its own identity and facility. From their retail experience they realized there was a gap in the acoustic market for affordable banjos. There were either cheap terrible playing offshore banjos, very high priced domestic built banjos, or classic vintage Gibson banjos which were priced above a beginner's budget. Wayne started experimenting with cost effective methods exposing the simplicity of the banjo's modest build. Using pre-tuned drumheads was a start, connecting with a dining plate company to develop the resonator (back of the banjo), then learning to shape the neck and bend the rims guickly and efficiently. Although the original handcrafted models were primitive, they played well enough for the price to rival competitors.

Around Fall of 1993, Wayne and Robyn purchased a facility off US-1 looking directly out at the Kennedy space center, across from what was Paul's Steakhouse and is currently Shilo's steakhouse, now occupied by Honeycutt and Associates. This was the first actual Gold Tone facility, and for about 2 years Gold Tone banjos were built locally in the US-1 building. Then something amazing happened when an industry trade magazine called Banjo Newsletter caught wind of this little performance "Travel Banjo" and asked for a sample to review. Upon an incredible review by the magazine, retailers from all over the country started placing orders for the affordable "TB-100" travel banjo. This is when Wayne and Robyn knew they had something special and decided to take a massive risk and dive into manufacturing banjos full time. This was certainly a risk for the two successful business owners and a nightmare for their two teenage daughter Lindsey and Amanda, whose parents are now full-time banjo builders!

With Wayne at the helm of design and building and Robyn managing quality control, demand surged, and their workshop couldn't keep pace with production. So, in the Winter of 1995, they attended the National Association of Music Merchants (NAMM) trade show in Anaheim. California, in search of an offshore factory who could keep the pricing affordable and quality high. This led him to factory liaison Paul Kim, who had connections with a small manufacturing company in Korea. Wayne made several trips to Korea spending countless hours in the factory working with staff to develop tooling, parts, and efficient banjo building processes, and over time they accomplished their goals. With rapid growth in 1996, Gold Tone decided to close Strings 'N Things for good and moved the Gold Tone facility from the US-1 building to the Strings 'N Things building off Hopkins across from the Sears Town Mall.

As Gold Tone continued to flourish and expand over the next few years, space for inventory became an issue. Conveniently, just south of their location on Hopkins was an old, 10,000-square-foot storage facility-turned-window manufacturing building which was going out of business. With help from local builder Mike Ammons, Wayne and Robyn invested into the facility and in 2008 opened the current Gold Tone facility location at 3656 S. Hopkins Ave.

Gold Tone guickly made a name with a core philosophy of meticulous attention to instrument production, ensuring that each piece reached customers in perfect condition. Despite their competitive prices, they remained steadfast in their commitment to instrument quality. They also gained recognition for crafting unique instruments and instrument parts exclusively available at their shop. These qualities attracted the attention of renowned musicians nationwide, including Bela Fleck, Melissa Etheridge, and Steve Martin. Many bands such as Luke Combs, Kenny Chesney, Zach Williams, Brooks and Dunn, Band Perry, Blake Shelton, Mumford and Sons, Billy Strings and many more utilize multiple Gold Tone instruments on stage

Over the next decade and a half Gold Tone has been blessed to staff



some of the best people and musicians in the Brevard area. With 20 employees, Gold Tone is now one of the largest Folk Music instrument manufacturers in the world! Now boasting relationships with seven international factories, Gold Tone is able to supply over 1,000 retail (Continued on next page...)

locations across the United States, including the largest retailers like Guitar Center and Sweetwater as well as 12 countries in Europe and Canada, which are supplied Gold Tone instruments through large distribution chains.

They even trademarked the term "Folkternative," which became synonymous with their innovative lineup of hybrid instruments. Picture banjos, guitars, mandolins, and more, all combined to offer a smorgasbord of acoustic options. This approach made it easy for musicians to explore different instruments, fostering a sense of

Over time, Gold Tone morphed into the "Gold Tone Music Group" shifting from just a manufacturer of Folk instruments to an enterprise of multiple companies. The Gold Tone Music Group is comprised of Seven companies: Gold Tone, Jose Ramirez Classical Guitars, Wood Song Guitars, Earth Tone Drumheads, Zero Glide Nut, Loop2Learn mobile application and are currently in contract to purchase one of the earliest American Made banjo companies started in 1960 — OME Banjos. This will bring manufacturing from Boulder Colorado to Titusville Florida starting 2024!

The company remains family owned and operated as it moves into its second generation. As Wayne and Robyn are spending more time with their five grandchildren, Justin Grizzle and Amanda Serrano manage the day-to-day operation of the business. Building from the solid foundation laid by Wayne and Robyn, Justin and Amanda have been driving Gold Tone's tremendous growth over the past several years, procuring distribution outlets in several countries, expanding sales with industry-leading retailers, gathering trademarks like "Folkternative" and "Mastertone", acquiring multiple competing companies, and pushing the enterprise into a more digital/data-driven era.

Wayne and Robyn remain active in Brevard's music scene under the name "Robyn the Bank" and can be heard playing out at local restaurants and festivals on any given weekend.

As Wayne aptly puts it, "The coolest thing is seeing people who grew up here in the 1980s, who know the full Strings 'N Things Story. It was a musical haven."

To celebrate 30 years, Gold Tone is preparing for a total exterior makeover. Though the exact details are still in the works, the company plans a mural outside the building to add flash and flair to the musical location.





t the City of Titusville, improving the health of the Indian River Lagoon is one of our top priorities. As stormwater runs across the land into inlets, pipes and ditches, different types of debris, sediments, and nutrients are picked up along the way. As stormwater makes its way into the lagoon it carries these pollutants as well, harming the ecosystem.

Excess nitrogen and phosphorus are two major pollutants of the lagoon because they contribute heavily to eutrophication: an overabundance of nutrients in a body of water. Eutrophication can cause harmful algae blooms (HABs) which depletes the level of oxygen in the water. Oxygen depletion can then harm or kill fish, shellfish, birds, mammals, and other aquatic life. It can also reduce the growth of important aquatic plants such as seagrass, which is an important food source for the Florida Manatee.

To prevent this pollution from reaching the lagoon, the City has implemented several stormwater projects that help reduce these pollutants. Many of these projects focus on nitrogen and phosphorus removal since these nutrients, as discussed above, are particularly problematic. These projects include stormwater ponds, vegetative infrastructure, and baffle boxes. These projects all work together to reach the ultimate goal of reducing nutrients from drainage areas before emptying water into the lagoon.

Stormwater Ponds

Retention ponds allow for storm water to be collected, treated, and then released at a controlled rate. Storm water flows into and collects in retention ponds. During this time pollutants like sediment and suspended particles settle to the bottom while the filtered water rises above. When enough stormwater enters the pond, the water from the top reaches a pipe that allows for its release. Retention ponds have good capacity to remove urban pollutants and improve the quality of surface runoff.

Floating Wetlands

Floating wetlands are man-made wetlands installed in bodies of water throughout the City. These wetlands provide the same benefits as natural wetlands do. Sediments and contaminants found in stormwater are filtered out through these floating wetlands which improves the overall quality of the water. As these wetlands rid water of agricultural nutrients there will be less algal blooms, dead zones, and lower greenhouse gas emissions that cause environmental damage.

Baffle Boxes

Baffle Boxes are stormwater structures designed to remove sediment, suspended particles, and other pollutants from storm water. The box contains a series of settling chambers separated by big concrete walls called baffles. As stormwater enters the box, pollutants settle while the filtered water rises and pours into the next chamber. The boxes also contain nutrient removal media that helps reduce the amount of nutrients in the water before it leaves the box and enters the Indian River Lagoon.

As of the date of this publication, these projects have contributed to an overall reduction of **39,953 lbs.** of Nitrogen, and **6,699 lbs.** of Phosphorus in the Indian River Lagoon, which is **123% – 138%** of the 2025 target reductions required by the Basin Management Action Plan (BMAP), which is a framework for water quality restoration and pollution reduction set forth by the state and local governments.

TITUSVILLE POLICE ACTIVELY RECRUITING

he Titusville Police Department is progressively recruiting police officers to keep up with the population boom the city is experiencing. One strategy the recruiting department implemented in 2023 is the position of Community Service Officer, a full-time position collecting the employee benefits offered through the City of Titusville. The intent of this position is to seek out those applicants considering a career in law enforcement who are unsure of the transition into the law enforcement field.

A Service Officer handles low-priority calls for service such as burglaries and frauds and assists with scene control at crime scenes and traffic crashes. It is a rewarding position that offers a glimpse into the Law Enforcement profession, this service officer would then be placed into a local law enforcement academy (approximately 22 weeks/770 hours) to earn their state law enforcement certificate and then begin their career as a police officer for the City of Titusville. TPD is considering this in their 2023/2024 recruiting pipeline.

Speaking of recruiting, we are active in the law enforcement transfer portal, seeking applicants who already possess a valid (non-expired) State of Florida Law Enforcement Certificate or a valid out-of-state law enforcement certificate. Out-of-state transfers with valid certificates would be placed into the Equivalency of Training program at a law enforcement academy to obtain a Florida Law Enforcement certificate.

TPD also offers competitive and progressive salaries to include salaries based on law enforcement experience and offers an innovative career development program. Honoring and Remembering Former Titusville Police Chief, Frank Ross



It is with a heavy heart that we announce the passing of Former Titusville Police Chief Frank Ross.

Frank Joseph Ross, 79, of Titusville, Florida "slipped the surly bonds of earth to touch the face of God" on September 24, 2023. After being born in Norfolk, VA, Frank spent his early years in South Carolina and Georgia, finally settling in Florida. Upon graduating from Titusville High School in 1962, Frank joined the Marine Corps of which he was always so proud. "Once a Marine, always a Marine!"

After serving four years as a Marine, he came back to Titusville and served with the Titusville Police Department. Then, he was hired as Police Chief in St. Cloud, Florida, and eventually as Police Chief in Kissimmee, Florida where he served for fourteen years. Frank distinguished himself by being chosen to attend the prestigious FBI Academy in Quantico, VA, and serving as President of the Florida Police Chief's Association.

During his career, he filled the position of Police Chief in Waynesville, NC, and then returned to Florida to become Titusville Police Chief, retiring as Assistant City Manager. Frank was innovative and was "ahead of his time" instituting a fitness program while in Kissimmee.

After he retired from the city in 2004, Frank was a law enforcement consultant and interim police chief in Brooksville, FL, and Orange City, FL.

"Frank Ross was a visionary and a true pioneer who taught the law enforcement profession to value your employees through professionalism, recognition, and accountability", said Titusville Police Chief John Lau. "The Titusville Police Department will always remember Chief Frank Ross for his timeless contributions to our community", added Lau.
