

Project Tin Goose



Your Chapter Secretary, Kimberly Brennan, will be acting as our *President for a Day*, and we are scheduled to host author and guest speaker Spencer Lane. Mr. Lane authored a book about the First World Flight, and will be giving a talk about “The Life and Times of General Billy Mitchell, and his role in The First World Flight in 1924”. This promises to be a very interesting and educational presentation. Come prepared to buy one of his books, either for yourself, or to give to someone as a gift.



Synopsis: In 1924, three years before Lindbergh flew to Paris, four young army airmen answered the call of General Billy Mitchell to save U.S. aviation from destruction by the politicians by winning the race with a dozen other nations to make the first flight around the world. In primitive open-cockpit biplanes powered by unreliable engines and few airfields, they were given little chance of success or even survival. This is the untold epic story of American patriotism, valor, and can-do ingenuity which triumphed over adversity and led to aviation dominance for the balance of the Century -- and the forgotten heroes that made it happen. Over 15 years of research, including the first access ever to the private Donald Douglas collection of Aviation memorabilia including worldwide newspaper accounts, diaries and logs of the aviators, have gone into the writing of this remarkable story.

“President for a Day” Reminder



Story about Chapter Member Carlos



New chapter Member Captain Carlos

The following story was written and published in a book called Blind Dog On The Travel Trail chapter #3 (available on Amazon)

Written by a fellow pilot in their aviation career, his name is Larry Kritcher.

When I was a copilot, I frequently flew with Captain Carlos, who was raised in Puerto Rico and spoke fluent Spanish. When a flight headed south from Miami, Carlos was a very good man---a skilled aviator to have in our cockpit. He translated our way through the Spanish world, making all of our lives much easier. Carlos is a very accomplished pilot, with great proficiencies and a very likable, fun personality. We spent many, many hours together in and out of the cockpit.

In the late 1980's, Carlos and I piloted a flight going from Lima, north to Panama. Air Traffic Control (ATC) notified us on our descent that the landing field was closed and under U.S. Military control. The country had just been invaded. WHOA WHAT? There would be no takeoffs, or landings during this military coup. The United States, in its highly activist sphere of influence, had invaded Panama that day to capture Manuel Noriega, Panama's reigning president and the correctly maligned military dictator, of drug trafficking, money laundering, and racketeering. He was abetting and profiting from the plunders of the Medellin drug cartel, based just to the south ---next door was Columbia. It was secretly planned and a very surprise attack, aptly named "Operation Just Cause." Wow, what a surprise it was---not only to the countries of Panama and Columbia, but to us crew members, and passengers. The normal alternate airport to Panama was International was Howard Air Base, a few miles away, but was also under U.S. military command, and closed. There was no other feasible place to land, and our fuel was limited. The closest open airfield was Costa Rica, which was a very questionable distance, and to land on near empty fuel tanks and thus was not a pleasant option. Of course, any airport in Columbia was out of the question.

Captain Carlos pleaded with the controllers, and they steadfastly said "NO." I made a radio call to Eastern Airlines Company Dispatch Services that routinely handled in-flight problems, and our plight was passed to them. We had descended from our cruising altitude of thirty-five thousand feet to a holding pattern of ten thousand feet with the Panama airport in sight. There were vehicles, including tanks, blocking the runways. A return call from dispatch asked how longer we could remain in the pattern and what our fuel situation was. They were trying to get authority from Washington for us to land. "we were still OK with fuel to make Panama, but no way could we go any further." We answered our company dispatch, which was making a call to the U.S. State Department, relating our near-dire situation.

Carlos decided that when the critical point was reached, an emergency would be declared, and we would land without the authority of the controller. Fine, so we would not have a fiery emergency landing in the jungle or a watery one in the Pacific Ocean, but we could get riddled with bullets. Actually, the choice was simple. A captain has the final authority to do as needed for the safety of his passengers and his aircraft. Moments before we were about to declare the emergency, we received word from the State Department that we could land, and subsequently park on a remote ramp. Only the flight engineer could disembark for onward fueling. The paperwork for a legal departure would be brought to the aircraft and handed up to us through the cockpit window.

They removed the tanks and half-tracks blocking the runway. We landed without incident and were escorted into a holding area for refueling. Carlos made an announcement in Spanish but made it my duty to make the announcement in English. "Ladies and Gentlemen, due to an invasion of the country of Panama, nobody will be permitted to get on or off the aircraft. The passengers with the destination of Panama will be carried onward

to Miami. We look for your understanding during this time of crisis.” Oh my God, Holy Freakin’ Howl. The passengers tried to disembark anyway. Of course, we were not connected to stairs or a jet way and there was no terminal. They begrudgingly gave up after a bit of shoving and pushing and some reseated themselves, which helped quell the huge disturbance. Passengers were infuriated and vengeful, (maybe rightly so,) with threats made, some calling us kidnappers. The U.S. Army Command mandated all procedures. I would have been overjoyed to allow an implacable, irate one or two, to leap the 9 feet out of the cabin door to the authorities with rifles and tanks below. We took off and three hours later landed in Miami. We were just grateful to be home safely without injury to our passengers and airplane.

Noriega was not found, and a few months went by. Another invasion occurred and we found out the fate of another Miami flight crew who were at a hotel in downtown Panama awaiting their return flight to Miami. A call from Eastern Dispatch Services was made to the captain that he and his crew should go into hiding. Noriega was surrounded and the invasion would be short-lived, but he still had loyal troops. They were out looking for American citizens for hostages, and of course, it was a shoe-in to find them at the large international hotels. When captain Jay found this out, he quickly gathered his crew and the seven of them went into hiding at the Marriott Hotel laundry room, deep in the bowels of the basement. There were two huge laundry dryers. They split up and crept inside the dryer drums for the duration. They later told stories of hearing the footsteps, of possibly the soldiers.

On this morning, Dad, (Les), was out flying his one place Panther airplane so Bob took her up in his Zodiac. Emily is a nice child and it's fun having her around Dunn airport with her dad.
